Free access codes for PrescQIPP Elearning Courses

As from March 2022 Health Education England no longer funds free access to the PrescQIPP GP Practice Medicines Co-ordinators eLearning Course. BSW CCG has therefore decided to purchase 50 licences .

This course serves as an introduction to medicines and the repeat prescribing processes within a GP practice setting, and is suitable for general members of the practice team undertaking medicines related tasks. Modules include: medication basics, information sources and requirements for prescriptions, repeat prescribing policies and processes, reducing waste, care homes and appliance contractors, hospital discharge, formularies, specials and prescribing incentive schemes, community pharmacy services and an introduction to diabetes, respiratory prescribing and antibiotics. This CPD accredited e-learning course is based on the NICE Clinical Guideline 196: Management of Atrial Fibrillation. It is designed for PCN and practice pharmacists and pharmacy technicians, GPs, nurse prescribers, medicines optimisation teams and community pharmacists. Modules include NICE guideline 196:assessing stroke and bleeding risk, Anticoagulant treatment options and choice of anticoagulant. BSW Area Prescribing Committee (APC) Updates

The BSW APC website includes info on the APC and BSWformulary decision making process. Decisions from the Feb 2022 meeting have been ratified and can be found in full here. Of particular note:

- Co-enzyme Q10 (ubidecarenone/ubiquinone) 30mg and100mg oral capsules added to formulary with AMBER SCA TLS only for use in the (off-label) treatment of mitochondrial disorders in children. Use for this indication may then continue lifelong. SCA for this indication here. Note that all other indications (e.g. managing statin-induced muscle symptoms) are **non-formulary** due to insufficient evidence. Unless used for diagnosed mitochondrial disorder, Co-Q10 supplements should be self-purchased OTC. SPS has some information here.
- Diprobase® ointment and Diprobase® cream removed from formulary; ointment is discontinued and cream has been reformulated. Existing patients can be switched to alternative formulary product see here or directed to self-purchase.
- As part of ongoing work to build the 'devices' chapter of our formulary, we have included information on approved indications for the restricted prescribing of waterproof protectors e.g. LimbO/SealTight on FP10 here. These protectors are available OTC and online; in most instances, patients should be directed to self-purchase.

Updated NICE Diabetes Guidance for Glucose Monitoring

"On Thursday 31st March 2022, the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) updated the recommendations in their Diabetes guidance in relation to glucose monitoring.

BSW CCG are aware of this updated guidance and people with diabetes should be assured that we are working closely with local Diabetes Specialist colleagues and other local stakeholders in relation to the implementation of this updated guidance, with the aim to maximise benefits, prioritise people with Diabetes with the greatest clinical need, and allow all people with diabetes access to the best possible treatment for their clinical circumstances. We would politely ask our people with diabetes to please bear with us whilst we complete this process. Further information will be released when available in due course."

Requests to convert Private Prescriptions to NHS FP10s

We routinely see enquiries from practices via <u>bswccg.prescribing@nhs.net</u> asking for advice on taking on prescribing from a Private Specialist (e.g. Mental Health Specialist).

Our Medicines Optimisation website has a newly added PrescQIPP document ,which has been adopted by BSW CCG, giving guidance and advice on private treatments, which may be of help to the clinician in making their decision. It can be read in full here:- Private Treatments. The pertinent information is if the medication is normally funded on an NHS prescription in primary care, i.e. on Formulary, for the condition then it can be prescribed on NHS. The excerpt below provides advice on when the request should be denied and the Private specialist will need to prescribe.

Do not routinely issue an NHS prescription following a private consultation if the medicine is:

- » Not included in the local NHS pathway
- » Not included in the local drug formulary
- » Only suitable for specialist/specialised prescribing
- Included further down the NHS treatment pathway after other alternatives which the patient is suitable for but has not tried

Wessex LMC has this information which mirrors our guidance, and also contains a patient letter template which can be adapted for use - Wessex LMCs: Requests to convert private prescriptions to NHS FP10

If the criteria for taking on prescribing on the NHS is met and the relevant drug is Amber Shared Care on Formulary the MO team would encourage the clinician to request that the private specialist provide advice and support as per BSW Shared Care agreements. We would also advocate that the patient be referred to the relevant NHS provider and the patient be encouraged not to remove themselves from the private care until such times as the NHS provider can take over otherwise you may find yourselves prescribing a drug without any specialist to resort to if problems arise.

Testosterone Testogel® Availability

The manufacturers of <u>Testogel</u> have discontinued Testogel 50mg sachet preparation and relaunched it in a different 40.5mg strength. This may lead to confusion and potential prescribing errors where used for its licensed indication (males) and also where used (unlicensed) in females. The table below aims to summarise the various forms of topical testosterone marketed in the UK. We are working on including this information into the existing BSW Shared Care Agreements (males and females).
