BSW Area Prescribing Committee (APC) Updates (see all recent decisions in full here)

- New additions to BSWformulary and Change in Traffic Light Status (TLS)
 - Loperamide Orodispersible Added with a RED TLS as an option for oncology teams to use in people with oesophageal cancer where opening capsules or crushing standard tablets has not been successful.
 - Primidone tablets Added as AMBER for essential tremor to allow GPs to prescribe following specialist initiation or recommendation.
 - <u>Risankizumab</u> and <u>Etrasimod</u> Included as options in the updated <u>BSW Inflammatory Bowel Disease Pathway</u> for treatment of ulcerative colitis as per NICE TA998 and TA956 respectively.
 - Linzagolix Tablets Added as AMBER in line with NICE TA996. New local guidance published here: Linzagolix (Yselty) for treatment of uterine fibroids

New and Updated Prescribing Guidelines and Shared Care Agreements

- UPDATE <u>BSW Malnutrition screening tools</u> This MUST pathway combines the previous two documents. It links into prescribing and gives guidance for starting, reviewing and stopping.
- UPDATE <u>BSW Oral Nutrition Supplements adult formulary</u> Dietetic support varies across BSW, this pathway guides prescribers to be able to prescribe for patients at risk, or suggest they purchase OTC, first line products to try before referring to dieticians.

Minor amendments to Netformulary

- Wording amended to Penthrox® entry
- <u>Victoza</u> brand of liraglutide has been discontinued and removed from formulary.
- Shingrix® vaccine programme had been updated.
- Clarification that <u>aspirin enteric coated</u> are non-formulary.

The BSW joint formulary remains under construction and is designed to be an evolving, dynamic resource. We are working to ensure the messages on GP prescribing systems and Optimise Profiles are in line with the joint formulary. 
Malnutrition Screening and Oral Nutritional Supplement (ONS) prescribing

- The **new MUST pathway** has streamlined 2 pathways which previously existed for Community and Care Homes into 1 document.
- A quick reference guide for preferred first choice ONS is now embedded within the document for ease.
- 'Food First' remains the mainstay of malnutrition management with ONS prescribing only where this approach has been maximised with no improvements.
- Our ONS formulary <u>ONS-Adult-Formulary-BSW-October-2024.pdf</u> has also been updated. Aymes Shake is now the preferred first line powdered supplement where <u>prescribing criteria</u> have been met. Altraplen Energy 200ml is the preferred first line ready made supplement where required.

How a team culture shift can reduce high dose opioid prescribing in chronic pain Over the last four years Abbey Meads medical Practice in Swindon have successfully adopted a team approach to reduce inappropriate high dose opioid prescribing. Their data from <u>OpenPrescribing</u> speaks for itself.



Key Messages from <u>Opioids Aware | Faculty of</u> <u>Pain Medicine</u> remind us that there is little evidence that opioids are helpful for chronic pain and the risk of harm increases substantially at doses above an oral morphine equivalent of 120mg/day, but there is no increased benefit: tapering or stopping high dose opioids needs careful planning and collaboration.

Thank you to Syma Rasool the Lead Clinical Pharmacists at Abbey Meads who has shared the following key steps they took as a practice team to facilitate this change:

- Prioritising reducing inappropriate high dose opioid prescribing for non-cancer pain.
- Identifying a named Pain Champion to lead a quality improvement approach
- Education & a consistent approach for all the practice team (including reception)
- Multidisciplinary clinical meetings to provide peer support for clinicians.
- Taking <u>The Live Well with Pain 10 Footsteps</u> approach and education
- Regular review tailored to the individual.
- Making every contact count by using information leaflets to reinforce messages, even for
 patients at the pre-contemplative stage. People may not realise the side effects they are
 experiencing are related to opioids e.g. <u>BSW Reducing or Stopping Opioids leaflet</u> Text
 templates also helped with this.
- Using <u>Live Well with Pain 10 Footsteps for Carers</u> really helped those people lucky enough to have support from a close friend or family.

EFFE Cost Saving drug switch of the month - Rizatriptan 10mg tablets and oral lyophilisates switching to orodispersible tablets

Product	Pack size	Cost
Rizatriptan 10mg orodispersible tablets sugar free	3	£5.48
Rizatriptan 10mg tablets	3	£7.11
Maxalt 10mg tablets	3 6	£13.37 £26.74
Rizatriptan 10mg oral lyophilisates sugar free	3 6 12	£13.37 £26.74 £53.48
Maxalt Melt 10mg oral lyophilisates	3 6 12	£13.37 £26.74 £53.48

In the past 12 months, £140k has been spent on rizatriptan 10mg preparations. By prescribing as orodispersible tablets, **over £44k can be saved across BSW**. Please note, the orodispersible tablets are the only rizatriptan formulation now included on the formulary.

Appliances - Did you Know?

When issuing catheters - any Leg/ night bag any can be issued for compatibility. The only time a patient may require a different Leg/Night bag would be a personal preference. i.e Size or capacity

Leg bags could be length of tube – Long 30cm or short 10cm - 500ml is a standard issue Leg bag.

Night bags could be capacity - 2 litre (standard use), always issue Single use - (these are drainable but have a non-return lever or slide tap) rather than drainable night bags. You will be able to tell the difference on these by the cost. Drainable night bags range from £12 upwards x10, whereas single use start from £3-6 x10.See also -<u>BSW Continence and Urology Products</u> Formulary

Points to Remember:

NO SABA without ICS in asthma!

STOP SABA if starting AIR or MART regimes!

(ICS/formoterol have a class effect, although licenses for MART and AIR vary, and some may be used off-label. Please refer to the SmPC - Summary of Product Characteristics - of the product you are prescribing for correct dosing and further information.)

The long awaited <u>NICE/BTS/SIGN asthma guideline [NG245]</u> was published on 27/11/24 and is now available. The guideline also contains various resources you can find <u>here</u>.

Our team is working on our local asthma guidelines, we are also updating the formulary, building searches and planning various educational events, so please watch this space!

Varenicline added to Formulary

After Champix brand was removed from the market in 2021 due to impurities, generic versions of varenicline, have now been approved by the MHRA and reintroduced. From Dec 2024 varenicline is approved again for use in BSW in line with local smoking guidance <u>BSW</u> <u>Community Stop Smoking Guide</u> Also see NCSCT information Varenicline
